The Science Behind Life-long Learning

"You learn something new each day." Have you heard that saying? It's important to challenge your brain with new information. Research studies show that as a brain ages, other parts of the brain can compensate for what is being lost and actually grow additional tissue to balance the changes. Even in later adulthood the brain can stay productive and active when stimulated to use these other areas. This is good news! Your neurons can adapt to the changes brought by aging when they are stimulated by socialization, learning new things, or exercise.

To maximize this stimulation that improves your brain, the study shows learning new skills are the best path. A community-based research project at the Park Center for Brain Health in Dallas had people learn a new digital photography skill, which they compared to learning advanced techniques in quilting. People who learned an entirely new skill had the most improvement in their brains.

Often what we do in Adult Day Services seems like simple fun but it can have scientifically proven benefits! In one corner, the men might be preparing wood blocks to build a bird house. In another area, a table of colorful beads is being turned into sparkly jewelry in the hands of talented crafters. Together with children from Los Niños del Valle, the group learns a new song. We dig out a computer version of Jeopardy to enhance trivia knowledge.

We have many other opportunities to try new skills such as leather or copper tooling or physical games. "Brain Games" are a daily part of our program. Participants use iPads to assist in learning.


Our Outdoor Classroom Plans are Taking Shape!

for their commitment to the organization of our large book collection. We now have quick access to titles organized under specific themes.

The children and teachers will be able to spend afternoons outside under the shade of the Aleppo Pine tree observing, drawing, and reading stories about the sights and sounds of the wonder of nature.

Our 3-year-olds are also intrigued by nature and specifically the food we eat! Where does it come

from and how does it grow? We'll be exploring "how does our garden grow" with Instructional Specialists, Jennifer Parlin and Jacqui Stork from the

U of A Cooperative Extension. Our teachers will gain valuable information for maximizing the garden's potential! Science inquiry

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and math concepts as well as social cooperation, communication, and problem-solving will be some of the skills the children will practice and learn managing the school garden. The learning opportunities will be bountiful, as will the harvest!
